GREGOR BAILAR '85 ADDRESSES MINI-REUNION ON TRANS SON

A tradition at the June mini-reunion breakfast is for all attendees to introduce themselves to the group, sometimes adding a few words about themselves. At this year's mini-reunion, Gregor Bailar '85 shared with the group, to much applause, the fact that his son would be starting at Harvard in the fall as the first NCAA transgender athlete. After the event, Gregor commented further to Green Light as set forth below. (Ed: More coverage of the mini-reunion appears on pages 4 and 5.)

I am happy to have a group like DGALA at Dartmouth and I was impressed by the College's attention to the needs and concerns of all students, including trans* individuals as articulated by President Hanlon at the meeting. Forums like this which provide for open discussion and action are critical to growth, awareness and inclusion.

The reception my son (Schuyler Bailar) has been given at Harvard and, by extension, the Ivy League and the NCAA is also truly exemplary. The coaches and team members have been welcoming and supportive - far beyond our expectations. In fact, the general response to Schuyler's coming out has been overwhelmingly supportive and it clearly demonstrates the changing spectrum of America today.

The world of sport has also been changing - and for once it appears that the rules and regulations are keeping pace with the public need. The NCAA approved rules that provide for inclusion of trans* athletes in 2011. Given the fact that the *Washington Post* reports that Schuyler is "the first openly trans* D1 swimmer," and perhaps the first trans athlete to compete on a collegiate men's team ever,

the NCAA's 4-year head start is clearly progressive.

She served on the Board of DGALA from 2004-14 and tells *Green Light*, "I am pleased to join the inaugural DGALA Board of Advisors and relieved that my time away from the organization was brief!"



Cherie Holmes '79 M.D. is Medical Director, Acute Care Services, at Cheshire Medical Center/ Dartmouth-Hitchcock, in Keene, NH. Cherie has served both as a Director of DGALA and a Dartmouth Alumni Council member. She told *Green Light*, "I hope to help bring to my new role a recognition of diversity and inclusivity within the Dartmouth GLBTQ community."

Ed Hermance '62 is the retired owner of Giovanni's Room, the legendary LGBT and feminist bookstore in Philadelphia. Ed is credited with founding DGALA, when he wrote to the *Dartmouth Alumni Magazine* in 1983, announcing the formation of an LGBT alum group and setting up its first meeting. Of his joining the Board of Advisors, Ed told *Green Light*, "It would be wonderful if I can contribute to making life better for students."



Nancy Vogele '85 served as Vice President of DGALA from 2000 to 2003 and as co-chair of its first all-class reunion in 2002. In 2012 she was named by the Tucker Foundation to become the Director of Religious and Spiritual Life at Dartmouth. Nancy told *Green Light*, "As a member of the Board of Advisors, I'm looking forward to helping Dartmouth continue to grow as a welcoming space for LGBTQIA+ students, staff, and faculty."



Susi Kandel '00 served as President of DGALA from 2006-11. She lives in Jersey City, New Jersey and serves as General Counsel, Latin America for American Tower Corp. Susi told *Green Light*, "The Board of Advisors is a fantastic initiative. It taps into the experience of DGALA leaders to maintain institutional history and provide a perspective different from the Board of Directors. At the same time, the members of the Board of Advisors are able to remain connected to the organization in a way that is less time intensive than being a director, but no less meaningful."

Dartmouth's LGBTQIA students again held a fabulous PRIDE celebration this spring, and DGALA continued its tradition of being a major supporter and contributor. The event included eight days of educational, artistic and community-building programming, with total attendance of over 1,000. The event's keynote speaker was transgender rights activist Janet Mock (see photo below). DGALA provided significant financial sponsorship for the event, and DGALA director Amanda Rosenblum '07 was the alumni speaker at the PRIDE Awards banquet on May 3rd.

Besides handing out DGALA t-shirts to the graduating seniors, Amanda gave a talk that was funny, thoughtful and inspiring. Amanda's remarks covered much ground, including her life as a student and her life after Dartmouth. In closing, she discussed DGALA and life after Dartmouth (see *remark excerpts, next*).

PRIDE Co-Chair Gustavo Mercado Muniz '16 told *Green Light*, "Amanda did a really good job sharing her story with current students and made it wonderfully relatable! She talked about meeting her partner here, breaking down class year distinctions, and activism/working for positive change in ways that spoke clearly towards relevant events on campus." Since Amanda's address, LGBT grads from the class of 2015 have joined DGALA in record numbers. ♦

EXCERPTS FROM AMANDA ROSENBLUM'S REMARKS

When I left Dartmouth, I had no idea what I was going to be doing the following week, let alone nearly a decade later. I'm finally realizing how deeply my experiences here prepared me for life. This isn't a bubble. Everything that happens here happens elsewhere. And it's here that I learned all the tools I need to organize, to care about the world and try to do something about it, to practice ally-ship, to hold myself and others accountable. I left here with a community of powerful people I respected and admired. Years later, I'm serving on the board of DGALA, the Dartmouth Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender Alumnae Association, and though I never thought I'd find my way back to them, it makes complete sense that I did.

We offer you t-shirts and membership and open

Q&A AT MINI-REUNION WITH PRESIDENT HANLON

Q. What is your reaction to past DGALA President Caroline Kerr's recent election to the Dartmouth College Board of Trustees? [Ed: see p. 5 for more on Caroline's election.]

A. I join you in being thrilled that Caroline is joining the Board. As you know I work in close partnership with the Board; what is important is that the Board brings to me a multiplicity of perspectives and experiences, and Caroline helps in this, with not only her experience at DGALA and as president of DGALA but also she will be our first post-2000 graduate on the Board.

Q. The other big event this year for us was the opening of Triangle House, for DGALA at our October reunion, although the students moved in in September. I'd love to get your perspective on that. And our thanks to you and Gail [Mrs. Hanlon] for being so visible and present at all the opening events; that meant so much to this community.

A. Triangle House is an important addition to our campus. And I was thrilled to be, as was Gail, at the opening. It is completing its mission as intended. It is fostering a positive, safe, respectful community for its residents. It is increasing the whole Dartmouth community's understanding of contemporary LGBTQIA issues. And it's helping residents to take their passions from ideas into action. And I want to credit all the residents there, along with UGA Logan Henderson '17, who has helped to create a space where everyone is able to express themselves authentically and where guests are welcome. So it is doing exactly what we had intended and hoped. In terms of the larger perspective of transforming the residential experience, Triangle House fits really well with our major objectives, which are to provide greater opportunities for students to connect with faculty and develop relationships with faculty beyond the classroom, to create an environment that supports community building and social interactions – it gives more options for that. And it also promotes experiential learning as residents

are learning about contemporary issues through living in a community centered on those issues. So it's doing what we had hoped; it's off to a fast start and it fits really well within our broader objectives for residential life. And I want to recognize DGALA for raising \$500,000 for the House and thank you because that was key for getting the project done.

Q. Talk to us a bit about the Moving Dartmouth Forward initiative. Can you describe in some ways how it might impact the members of our community with respect to inclusiveness?

A. Yes, inclusiveness is one of the key objectives, along with reducing harmful behaviors. So one of its aspects is the climate study that will be conducted next fall. The results of that will be very important for us as we better understand our community here, what's going on, how we can direct programs and resources to make it a better place. There is a broader faculty diversity effort that has included several things to promote faculty diversity which is one of our weak spots right now; we need to have a more diverse faculty for sure.

Q. Do you have any thoughts on queer studies, part of our academic programs? I believe now that there is only one professor focusing on the field.

A. I'm really glad you asked that and I understand the point that you are making, and it fits with our effort to diversify the faculty. The actual priorities for academic programs, investment in academic programs, whether it is money or space or the like, begins with the faculty; the faculty themselves establish collectively what the priorities should be. They take that to the Dean of Faculty, who is directly responsible for the allocation of resources. I will pass along the interests of this group to the Dean of the Faculty. But I urge you to talk to the faculty, for that is really where the priorities emerge. [Ed: for full transcript of the Q&A, see <http://dgala.com>.] ❖
