

BETH ROBINSON '86 RECOUNTS



On the evening of Thursday, January 21st of this year, DGALA screened online the documentary “The State of Marriage” starring DGALA member Beth Robinson '86. The film tells the gripping story of the battle for marriage equality in Vermont, which extended from the mid-1990s until 2009, with many twists and turns along the way. Following the

screening, Beth joined the Zoom for a chat with DGALA alums moderated by DGALA director (and Beth's fellow Indiana native) Erik Ochsner '93. An amazing crowd of DGALA members attended the event, many of whom have been active in the field of marriage equality and/or LGBTQIA+ advocacy in general.

Beth recounted during the Zoom how she started as a young attorney in a small-town Vermont law firm, where she and her colleague Susan Murray began to advocate for marriage equality across the state. The idea had its genesis when a Vermont lesbian couple was involved in a car accident in which one of them was killed. Murray had represented the surviving partner in a battle to retain custody of their 3-year-old son, and that case heightened her awareness of the legal vulnerability of same-sex couples. Beth emphasized on the Zoom how telling such personal stories of real people is critical to gaining political support for a controversial issue like marriage equality.

Eventually Beth and Susan, with support from renown LGBTQIA+ advocate Mary Bonato of Massachusetts, brought suit on behalf of three same-sex Vermont couples seeking affirmation of their right to marriage equality under the Vermont constitution. They achieved a landmark victory before the Vermont Supreme Court in 1999, but the court referred the issue to the Vermont legislature, which legalized civil unions (but not actual marriage) for same-sex couples in April 2000. Yet the matter was far from settled, and Beth acknowledged on the Zoom that her team was unprepared for the political firestorm that followed. Opponents to equality started a “Take Back Vermont” campaign to unseat legislators

who had voted for civil unions, and many lost their seats in the elections that fall. But the opponents never won enough political power to outlaw civil unions. And during the 2000's, Beth and many others slowly built a political consensus in favor of full marriage equality, which was legalized in Vermont in 2009 over the veto of the Republican governor. In 2011, the new Vermont governor, a former Democratic legislator who had gotten to know Beth during the course of the legislative battles over marriage, appointed her as a Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court, an appointment that was unanimously confirmed by the Vermont Senate.

Speaking about the event to *Green Light*, Beth said, *“I was struck by the fact that so many people on the Zoom call have done (and are doing) amazing things to make the world a better place. It made me proud to be part of the DGALA community.”*

DGALA/DCF SCHOLARS

On May 5 at 5PM DGALA partnered with the Dartmouth College Fund to hold a Zoom Q&A with two of this year's DGALA/DCF Scholars, Colin Goodbred '21 and Jessica Zhang '21. Colin is a Quantitative Social Science major from Brentwood, Tennessee, and Jessica, from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, majored in Linguistics. They are recipients of two of this year's DGALA/DCF need-based scholarships. (See page 8 for how you can support more Scholars.)



The Q&A was moderated by DGALA President Mel Pastuck '11. Each student gave a 6-minute presentation (with photos) of their lives at Dartmouth and beyond, followed by discussions with the alums on the Zoom.

Jess focused on two of her major activities at Dartmouth, the first as Social Chair of Phi Tau, a gender-inclusive Greek house on North Main Street. Jess described how, in the midst of the pandemic, she led organization of a variety of events, both virtual and in-person.

Colin described three of his most significant undertakings, both at and away from Dartmouth. First he told of how, as a transgender man then presenting as a woman in high school, he avoided sports, but at Dartmouth he took up running during his sophomore year, later joining Dartmouth's co-ed triathlon team and eventually becoming a captain of the team this year. Colin next recounted his advocacy initiative, along with other Dartmouth



transgender students, to (successfully!) testify against a bill in the New Hampshire legislature that would ban transgender women students from participating on women's teams. Finally, Colin described how (partly as a result of discussions at a College philosophy course) he came to donate a kidney to a stranger during his off term amidst the pandemic.



Both Jess and Colin spoke about the significance to them of the DGALA/DCF Scholars

program. Jess described how, in addition to simply enabling her to afford to come to Dartmouth, the DGALA/DCF program had a special meaning to her *“just in terms of being able to connect to this [LGBTQ+] community and also helping me to embrace my own identity. I went to an all-girls school in high school where ... I definitely had some unpleasant interactions with people at the school. And I think that, since I've come to Dartmouth I've been able to just grow more comfortable with my own identity and interact with LGBTQ+ spaces, without this fear of ‘Oh, what if someone says something about it, or if what if they think that I'm a certain way because of who I am.’”* And so having this opportunity of being recognized as a Scholar just really helped me reaffirm like how far I've come in terms of just embracing my identity and finding a space.”

Colin added, *“Knowing that I was going to have the financial aid that I needed really gave me a lot more confidence in applying to Dartmouth.... And I definitely think that there's something special about knowing that that support is coming from other LGBT people who may have had great experiences at Dartmouth, or may not have, but either way are interested in supporting future students who are hopefully continuing to slowly make changes and slowly make Dartmouth, a better place for other queer people.”*

On May 13 at 7PM DGALA partnered with the student LGBTQIA+ group Within to present via Zoom a career panel at which students could hear from alums regarding their experiences as LGBTQIA+ people in their varied workplaces. The panelists were chosen based upon requests from students regarding their areas of interest. Besides those depicted in the images on this and the next page, panelists also included former DGALA

President Brendan Connell '87, COO and General Counsel of the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures in LA, and current DGALA Vice President Lee Merkle-Raymond '86, Sr. Managing Director, Risk, at Hercules Capital, Inc.



The event was well attended by students, who asked meaningful questions, such as "What was your path to your current career?", "How has your LGBTQIA+ identity affected your career?", and "How do you maintain a work/life balance?" Comments from the panelists included "It is always better when you present your true self in your professional career"; "Progress on a career is

more like a jungle gym than a straight ladder"; "Don't compare yourself to the 'stars' in your class – your career is a long haul; it will have up's and down's" and "Do what you love!". Rebecca Perkins Kwoka '04 described how she is very up front as an elected official about her non-traditional family. Networking was discussed, with some noting that fellow DGALA alums can be positive contacts.
